Funding for Community Green Spaces (East & West Midlands, the South West, & South Wales)

Grants of up to £10,000 are available to support communities across the East and West Midlands, the South West, and South Wales to enhance their local environments and encourage more people to make the most of their green spaces.

National Grid Electricity Distribution has teamed up with Localgiving to make a total of £500,000 in funding available for projects that use green spaces to bring communities together, encourage more wildlife and biodiversity, improve air quality, reduce noise and deliver health benefits, as well as creating employment and volunteering opportunities.

The funding is available to charities, community groups, and other not-for-profit organisations through the Community Matters Fund – Green Spaces, which closes to applications on the 12th May 2023.

Lloyds Bank Foundation - Racial Equity

Grants are offered to small local organisations who work with people that have faced inequity because of their race or ethnicity.

Who can apply: Registered charities, CICs and CIOs with an annual turnover of £25,000 - £500,000.

Themes/aims of the fund: Funded organisations will be working with people experiencing inequity over a long period of time to assist them in breaking free from poverty and achieving their potential.

How much funding per project: £75,000 over 3 years - unrestricted

Closing date: 31st May 2023.

Who can apply: Organisations in their first year, or with an income under £250,000

Themes/aims of the fund: Applications will be accepted under one of seven themes, including enabling participation in physical activity; preventing or reducing the impact of poverty; and supporting marginalised groups and tackling inequality.

Closing date: October 31st 2023.

The Clothworkers Foundation

Overall details: The Clothworkers Foundation is the charitable arm of the Clothworkers Company, providing grants towards capital projects since 1977.

Who can apply: Registered charities, CICs, CIOs and Special Schools.

Themes/aims of the fund: The foundation will provide capital funding towards buildings; fitting, fixtures and equipment; and vehicles (with the exception of leasing).

How much funding per project: Small and large grants are available, with their Trustees taking the final decision on the size of grant to award.

Closing date: There are no deadlines for this funding.

The Hedley Foundation

Overall details: The Hedley Foundation is a grant giving charitable organisation who support small to medium sized UK registered charities operating across the spectrum of social need.

Who can apply: UK registered charities

Themes/aims of the fund: They are open to applications under 4 themes - youth support; disabled support; supporting the elderly and terminally ill; and miscellaneous support.

How much funding per project: Typically grants of around £5,000 are made, but projects which can demonstrate significant social impact may, on occasion, be awarded a higher amount.

Closing date: The Trustees meet 4 times per year to review grant applications - click the link below for full information.

Grants of up to £10,000 are available for small charities and projects in the UK working to support disabled children and their families on a daily basis.

Millennium Stadium Charitable Trust (opens 1 May 2023)

Charitable, voluntary, and not-for-profit organisations with a remit to deliver regional projects in Wales can apply for up to £7,500 from the Millennium Stadium Charitable Trust.

The trust provides financial support to inspiring projects that focus on the arts, community, environment and sport. Priority in each category is given to organisations serving groups and communities suffering from greatest disadvantage.

Leathersellers' Fund small grants programme

Charities registered and operating in the UK (except for Community Interest Companies) can apply to the Leathersellers' Small Grants Programme 2022-23 for a one-off grant of up to £5,000. Applications will be considered from organisations that:

- provide assistance to vulnerable people in their community
- operate in geographical areas of deprivation (within the UK)
- have an annual income of under £200,000 (secured for the coming year).

There are 10 rounds for applications to be submitted, and will be accepted on a first-come, first-served basis.

Children in Need - Core Costs scheme

Children in Need is offering grants of up to £120,000 to charities and not-for-profit organisations working with children and young people aged 18 years or under in the UK. The grants are to support core expenses required to keep organisations running.

The Core Costs funding can be spent on organisations' central day-to-day operations. These might include:

- management and administration
 - human resources and payroll
 - general office expenses
- accountancy and audit
 - communications and outreach
 - monitoring, evaluation, and learning
- governance, regulatory, and compliance costs.

Applicants to this programme can apply for grants for up to three years and applications are not time limited.

The Moondance Foundation

The Moondance Foundation offers grants to organisations and causes that have a transformational impact in their communities, in Wales and beyond.

The focus of Moondance's funding programme includes the prevention or relief of poverty, supporting the welfare of children, improving health outcomes and raising educational standards.

Moondance accepts applications for funding from registered charities, constituted community groups, social enterprises, community interest organisations (CIOs), community interest companies (CICs) and other not-for-profit organisations. Applications to the programme are not time limited.

The Welsh Church Act Fund

The Welsh Church Act Fund is available to constituted community groups and charities operating in the County Borough areas of Rhondda Cynon Taf, Merthyr and Bridgend. Organisations must provide activities that have long term direct benefit to residents and communities within these areas and must be open to members of the public at large. There are three levels of grant small (up to £2,000), medium (up to £10,000), and large (up to £50,000)

It provides support for capital expenditure such as:

- Refurbishment of a community buildings or places of worship;
- Purchase of capital equipment;
- Other purposes beneficial to the wider community.

The Fund operates on a rolling programme basis. There are no set bidding rounds and fully developed applications can be submitted at any time.

Postcode Community Trust 2023

The next funding round for Postcode Community Trust 2023 will open at 10am on the 1st of June for a minimum of 24hrs. Applications will only be accepted during the above time periods and must be started and submitted within the submission window. For each round, this window will be a minimum of 24 hours, starting at 10am on the nominated date.

Funding is available between £500 - £25,000 and is focused on charities and good causes in Wales that fall under the following themes:

- · Support to improve mental health
- Enabling participation in physical activity
- · Enabling participation in the arts
- · Preventing or reducing the impact of poverty
- · Supporting marginalised groups and tackling inequality

Landfill Disposal Tax Communities Scheme

A grant funding programme to help communities living within five miles of certain waste transfer stations or landfill sites take action for their local environment.
